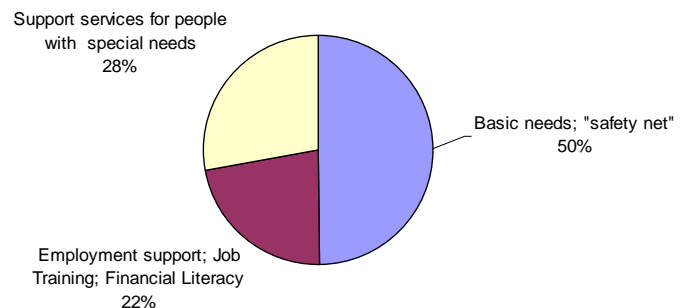

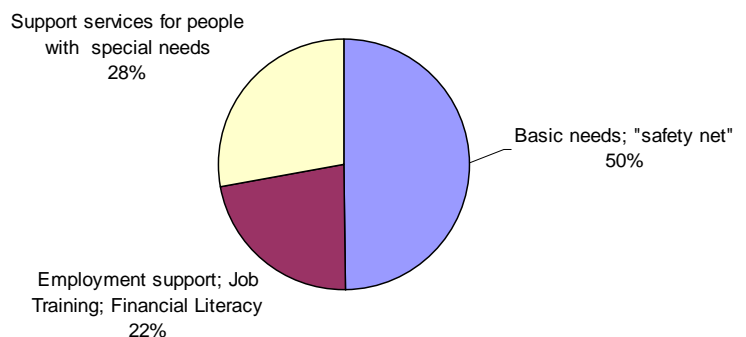

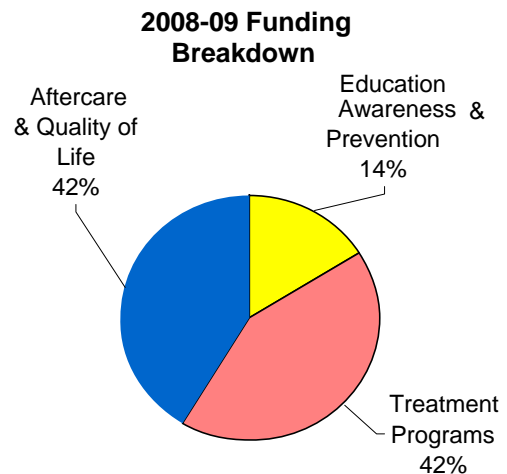

Prevention programs make up a small but important part of this priority area. *Be in the kNow* is a community-wide program promoting awareness of the harmful effects of alcohol and drugs during pregnancy. At-risk children are target for in-school *Life Skills Training* which is designed to increase their self-esteem and lower their likelihood of drug or alcohol use to impress their peers.

Treatment and Aftercare programs share an equal percentage (42% each) of the dollars available for this priority. Detoxification and treatment programs are in high demand in this County – and are often out of reach for children, adolescents and adults who cannot afford the cost. UWAC dollars provide access, which is the first step towards recovery. *Hansen House* and the *Recovery Mentor program* provide the next step in the journey – teaching those in recovery how to get – and keep – their lives on track.

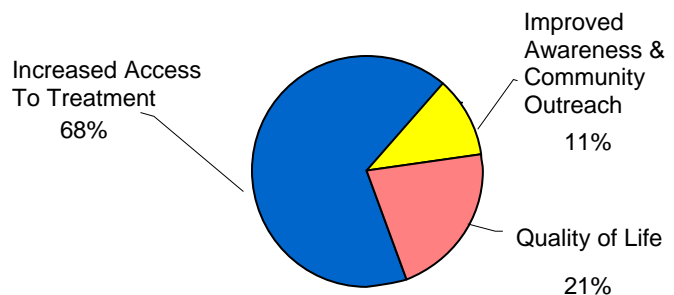
68% of UWAC funding for this priority gives access to counseling and treatment to children, adolescent and adults who cannot afford to pay for it on their own. Our partners in this endeavor are AtlantiCare Behavioral Health and Family Service Association.

Increased awareness of Autism Spectrum Disorders means children are diagnosed more accurately and connected more quickly with special needs services. *Project Aware* is training physicians and helping to intervene on behalf of children presenting with signs of this disorder.

The long-term effects of childhood incest and rape often go unaddressed by victims until adulthood. The Violence Intervention program provides counseling and support for victims of sexual trauma; establishing a new framework for healing and the ability to develop healthy relationships and a positive quality of life.

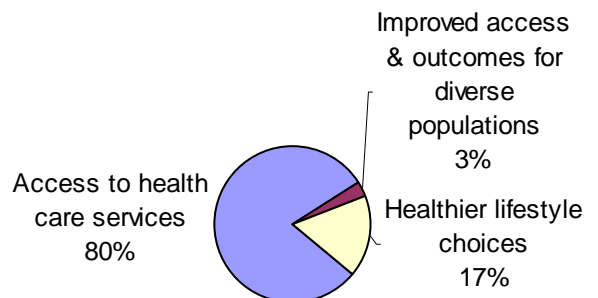
